A bit about my family and I...

For me, my journey of faith has been life long and I expect will continue to be so. My heart is for connecting people with God, and his love for them. I have journeyed myself in understanding God's love for me, and truly accepting it and letting it change my behaviour in this world. I am still on that journey, very much a work in progress. But I do have this deep belief that we are called to live lives trusting in God's love for us, rather than driven by fear. And I am inspired and sustained in this, by the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, whom I believe proves God's love for us, proves his power to redeem all things, and so enables us to trust God once again.

My family and I join you after serving as curate at St Chad's Far Headingley in Leeds. Prior to that we were briefly with the lovely people at St Edmund's Roundhay, and for a much longer time part of the community at St James Woodside, Horsforth. Before our time in Leeds, I attended St Peter's, Harrogate, which is where I was confirmed, and Rob and I were married.



- Plant trees.
- Litter pick.
- If you have garden lights, make sure they are turned off when they are not needed during the night insects and birds are getting confused!

A View from The Pews by Dominic Hall

Whilst for some, September may be a month of new beginnings – particularly for those going to university - for many, it is a month of renewal. Most children will be returning to their old schools and renewing friendships that may have lapsed over the summer.

The guestion in my mind this month is, how do we cope with change, especially when something had seemed so familiar? Those children returning to their old school will, of course have advanced a year. For some this will mean the start of study for exams that will set the course of their lives. Inevitably there will be pressures both internal and external that will prey on them. Here is where friendship comes in. The friends these children have made over the years will, in most cases, be in the same boat and can be companions on the journey. Teachers and families also play a vital role. Not just in terms of providing subject knowledge and preparing for exams, but more importantly because they, like all of us, have been there and know those pressures. There is an awful lot to be said for experience, but it comes with a caveat. The pressures we had in our youth evolve in every generation. Whilst much stays the same there are always changes – particularly in technology – that make each child's experience unique. Those of us who have been there will need to remember that and to offer a space in which to listen and support when that is needed.

As the children are getting to grips with changes to the familiar, so we, as a congregation will need to adapt to some change. September will see us welcoming our new vicar, Joanna, and her family to the village.

The fundamentals of our worship and church life will, of course, stay largely the same. However, any person starting a new job is employed not to be a carbon copy of what has gone before. This is a moment of transition for us all and, as with the teachers and families above, we can smooth that transition if we listen openly and with an acceptance that the destination for us all is the same.

If, like me, you are one of those people who has a mortal fear of walking into a room of strangers, you will know the overwhelming relief of a smile or a friendly word. The key message for this month, then, is the power of friendship and listening to stave off the pressures wrought by change in the familiar.

Bradford North Food Bank

Without help they would struggle to give those referred to them a balanced and nutritious three day supply of food. Across the country, Trussell Trust foodbanks currently feed over 2 million people.

PCC Notes Catherine Meakin

PCC met on the 15 July and began planning for the arrival of Reverend Joanna Glenwright and her family. They hope to move into the vicarage the week beginning the 19 August. The PCC will convene to tidy the garden and clean the house on the 16 August and will provide some family meals for them while they unpack and settle into the vicarage.

The licensing service will take place at 3pm, Sunday 8
September, in place of the 11am service. Zest will run as normal and there will be provision made for children during the licensing before they join the service towards the end to help welcome our new vicar. Details of this service will follow.

Church finances were discussed with the welcome news that the new energy provider should result in significant savings going forward and is also a greener energy provider. The Generous Church group will meet in August to look at resources

and options to present to Reverend Glenwright on her arrival.

The maintenance day held at the end of June was a success, with many parts of the church looking cleaner, brighter and tidier. This may become more regular and some tasks will continue over the summer, volunteers always welcome.

The churchyard handover to Bradford Council is progressing, albeit slowly, and so members of the PCC are looking at alternatives for cutting the grass, including external funding and contractors. Please bear with us while we try to tame the churchyard wilderness. We are so grateful to the small number of volunteers who continue to do their best on what is such a difficult site.

OUTREACH

Although we have not committed to supporting USPG, the Anglican mission agency around the world, as part of our charity voting process, some of us still support the charity and receive its updates and prayer diary. For August the diary is focussing on 'Whom Shall I Send'. A familiar refrain in a favourite hymn but in this context, it is about the training programme to equip lay and ordained young people to serve in local parishes in the Middle East. Given the ongoing conflict, they are asking for our prayers for these young people, for justice and peace in the Holy Land and for people of all faiths in that region. I could only think, 'Amen' to that and we would encourage you to pray for them too.

For September, the focus is on Creationtide. The commentary suggests that 'the times we live in show that we are not relating to the earth as a gift from our Creator, but rather as a resource to be used. It suggests that there is hope and expectation for a better future. To hope in a biblical context does not mean to stand still and quiet, but rather groaning, crying and actively striving for new life amidst the struggles. Just as in childbirth, we go through a period of immense pain but new life springs forth.'

The prayer for 1 September is:-

You made the goodness of the land, the riches of the sea and the rhythms of the seasons; as we thank you for your gracious provision may we cherish and respect this planet and its people. Amen.
